Big Pine Meeting Summary	
	Integrate public/private partnerships into agency (resources)
	Continuing organization to sustain interests after planning
	Symbiotic relationship is active stewardship by recreationist
	Wilderness designation may/does present challenges
	Over use (grazing/packers) may have negative impacts to wilderness
	Active stewardship is preventive too
	How to create/encourage stewardship expectations for visitors too
	NGO's provide volunteers to oversee stewardship (trainings – Colorado example of active agency engagement)
	Partnerships by agency w/other NGO's to connect youth to public lands (get outdoors)
	Visualize how grandchildren will have wilderness and what to do to make sure they have wilderness
	Recognize the diversity of species in wilderness (beyond human)
	Monitoring will be key to understand what is happening in order to sustain
	Mitigation of recreation impacts
	Concept of "near wilderness" less restrictive/more alternatives based upon area resources
	Wilderness can protect recreation values
	Funding to agency needed to protect resources and values

- ✓ Impacts to natural conditions one use impacts another use
- ✓ Multiple use may offer opportunities to gain new experiences see land thru different eyes

- ✓ Constraints of land managers ability to manage/ make decisions
- ✓ Degradation of trails by mixed use (compatibility)
- ✓ Conflicts between diverse users
- ✓ Noise

- Distribute different uses
- Odd/ even days for multiple uses time share trails
- Manage INF protection of soundscape as valuable
- Education/understanding what is available to access
- ➤ We can work together
- Safety use bells on trails (Santa Barbara example)
- Need for new trail development (front country dispersal) demand population dispersal
- ➤ Need mechanism/tool to facilitate getting action need path for solving the problem
- Wayfinding/signage education of directions where to go?
- Facilitate "civil" dialogue between groups to learn about each other
