Public lands in the United States hold the creation stories, burial grounds, and ceremonies of Indigenous people who were killed or forcibly removed from their ancestral homes during territorial acquisition.

Many tribes, comprised of different bands, live in the Eastern Sierra region, caring for their native lands as they coexist with the ongoing impacts of colonization. Past or present tribes and bands associated with the region that this effort is aware of include, but are not limited to, the Miwok, Mono Lake Kutzadika'a, Mono/Monache, Nüümü (Paiute), Newe (Shoshone), Timbi-Sha, Utu Utu Gwaitu Paiute, and Washoe.

Two Nüümü terms describe the region and provide important context to ideas offered in this presentation. The first is Pamidu Toiyabe (Western Mountains), and the other, more widely known, place name is Payahuunadü (The Place Where Water Flows).

This acknowledgement is an invitation to all organizations, residents, and visitors to recognize the way this history has shaped the present as all parties work together in anticipation of a better future.

## **Federal Government Shuts Down Over Health Care Subsidies**

The federal government is currently in a shutdown triggered by a lack of bipartisan agreement on government funding and access to health care coverage.

Congressional Democrats have pledged not to vote on a budget extension and end the government shutdown unless Congress extends subsidies for Affordable Care Act Marketplace plans.

#### **Fall Open Enrollment Creating Urgency**

Many Republicans in Congress argue that there is plenty of time before the end of the year to extend the subsidies, if they should be extended at all. But Marketplace open enrollment begins November 1. This gives little time for Congress to clarify what subsidies will be available before people begin shopping for coverage. People who shop for plans before the decisions are made could leave without enrolling and it may be hard to reach them later once the prices are updated.

#### Dear Partner:

Thank you for your ongoing collaboration and support of important priority work for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forest Service. I am writing to share information regarding the lapse in appropriations for FY 2026.

During this lapse in appropriations, the Forest Service is operating in accordance with the USDA Shutdown Plan (https://www.usda.gov/sites/default/files/documents/fy2026-usda-lapseplan.pdf), with a focus on life, safety, and Administration priorities. This priority work is being carried out by employees who are exempt from furlough and funded by sources other than annual appropriations. Many activities and projects associated with supplemental appropriations (e.g., deferred maintenance projects funded by Great American Outdoors Act, disaster recovery projects funded by American Relief Act, etc.) are still active.

To keep key partners apprised of our operations, I am sharing the following guidance which was provided to our field offices on October 3, 2025. Its intent is to help clarify the type and level of work allowed during this lapse in appropriations. This guidance could change over the course of the lapse in appropriations. If that is the case, we will provide an updated letter.

- . Travel: Travel for Forest Service employees is only allowed for the field delivery of exempt activities related to critical functions by employees designated as exempt. This does NOT include travel for attending meetings, conferences, or other non-critical
- · Payments: Payments will be processed for work performed by contractors or cooperators (contracts, grants, and agreements) deemed appropriate pursuant to the guidance issued for work considered a priority.

For work connected to efforts that are not considered to be a priority, invoices may be submitted for contracts, grants, or agreements during the lapse in appropriations; however, payments will not occur until the lapse in appropriations has ended.

For wildfire and emergency work, the Agency will continue to process payments, including those for casual hires (administratively determined) on emergency assignments.

- . Law Enforcement: Law Enforcement and Investigations (LEI) will focus on protecting employees and the public, Forest Service facilities, and developed recreation areas. LEI personnel will collaborate with local line officers as needed to ensure alignment.
- . Recreation: National Forest recreation sites remain open during the Federal government's lapse in funding. However, some services may be limited or unavailable. Our ability to maintain this operational status will be continuously monitored and is subject to change based on budget considerations and Administration priorities. Forest Service employees who directly support developed recreation site operations are continuing to work. Volunteer activities, such as campground hosting, will continue under existing agreements. Outfitter and guide services may continue under existing agreements. Regular seasonal closures will proceed as planned. Visitor centers, unless operated by a third party, will be closed. Concessionaire operations are not impacted by the lapse in funding. Recreation special uses, such as ski areas, are also continuing operations. Partner and contract work under existing funded agreements is currently ongoing and will continue as funding allows.
- Timber Production: Forest Service timber work is aligned with Executive Order (EO) 14225, "Immediate Expansion of American Timber Production". Therefore, all aspects of active forest management will continue as normal.
- . Active Harvest Projects: Active timber sale contracts, special forest products, and integrated resource contracts (Integrated Resource Timber Contracts and Integrated Resource Service Contracts) will continue. Good Neighbor Authority and agreements that include product removal administered through partners including States, Tribes, counties, and other partners, may continue if the project does not involve funding that may result in violations of the ADA.
- · Bid Openings and Stewardship Offerings: All current advertisements for timber and forest product sales, as well as stewardship contract offerings, will continue as planned. Bid openings and oral auctions may continue, and appropriate sale officers. contracting officers, forest products resource specialists, and collection officers will be available to conduct the sealed bid or oral auctions.
- . Timber Contracting Support Functions: Refunds, bill cancellations, and other transactions should be submitted in accordance with standard processes and procedures. Online processing systems will be available for routine business transactions after annual
- Special Forest Product Permits: Over-the-counter sales of special forest products permits will continue because most are firewood permits which have a direct connection to human health and safety. Permits already sold to the public are still valid within their existing terms and conditions, and some permits may still be purchased online.

- . Working Capital Fund Nursery System: The Working Capital Fund Nursery System and staff, which includes six nurseries and two stand-alone seed extractories, will continue normal operations as they are critical life and safety facilities that process and protect the nation's seed cache and other living biological material and seedlings.
- · Reforestation and Stand Improvement Activities: Reforestation (e.g., planting, seeding, and surveys or certifications), stand improvement (e.g., non-commercial thinning, release, etc.), and other related activities (e.g., site preparation or cone and acorn collection) will continue.
- · Environmental Compliance Activities: It is expected that planning and associated processes for projects pursuant to EOs will continue through the lapse in appropriations. This includes but is not limited to compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act, National Historic Preservation Act, and Endangered Species Act. The Forest Service will continue to work on the nationwide environmental assessment to expedite post-fire recovery in burned areas, facilitating safe infrastructure, healthy forests, and timely recovery of forest products important to rural economies and communities reliant on National Forest Systems lands. This is a Forest Service and USDA priority in response to EO 14225 and Secretarial Memo 1078-006, "Increasing Timber Production and Designating an Emergency Situation on National Forest System Lands".
- . Grazing: In general, the Forest Service will not provide daily oversight of grazing operations except in a few special cases, such as complying with court-mandated, periodic oversight and monitoring direction, or facilitating orderly, end-of-grazing-season removal of livestock.

Upon the enactment of appropriations or a continuing resolution, Forest Service offices and facilities will resume program activities consistent with all applicable Agency and USDA





"Roughly 500 years ago in California's High Sierra, pine cones dropped to the ground and a cycle began. Half a millennia later, U.S. Forest Service scientists began testing strategies to save these now ancient and massive trees in the little-known area east of Fresno called the Teakettle Experimental Forest. They had plans to light a huge prescribed burn to clear overgrowth next year. But then the Garnet Fire ignited amid a lightning storm and scorched all 3,000 federally protected acres on its path through the Sierra National Forest. "

# Situational Awareness Happenings of Interest






Tourism is a fragile industry, susceptible to global events. Conflict, terrorism, or health emergencies can rapidly alter travel patterns. Recent situations, such as the war in Ukraine, underscore this sensitivity. Europe, a leading destination, faces challenges in balancing safety perception with market diversification.

#### **Ukraine Crisis: Shifting Markets and Perceptions**

The war in Ukraine has hurt destinations reliant on Russian tourists like Turkey and Greece. **Sanctions and travel restrictions have effectively shut down the Russian market**. More broadly, the war has created a sense of insecurity in Eastern Europe. Poland and the Baltic states, for instance, have launched reassurance campaigns to distance themselves from associated dangers.





Colorado mountain towns see a rare summer slump in visitors as statewide tourism slows

Colorado hosted 95.4 million visitors who spent \$28.4 billion in 2024, an increase largely from day-trippers. The state is worrying about a decline in international visitors who stay longer, spend more.

with previous shutdowns, allows us to draw some broad conclusions about how bad this could be.

That report is the 2024 National Park Visitor Spending Effects, an annual tabulation of total spending from park visitors. It finds that visitors spent \$29 billion in gateway communities last year, a full 10 percent increase from 2023, which held the previous record. That supported over 340,000 jobs, creating \$18.8 billion in labor income. Total spending across visitations to all 433 national park sites along with the subsequent employment and supply chains created \$56.3 billion in total economic output, again a new record.





Yosemite National Park remains open during the current government shutdown. Park gates are open, although staff is not in place and entry fees are not being collected. The park concessionaire, Yosemite Hospitality, continues operating, food and lodging services are available

Roads, trails, campgrounds, and sanitation facilities are accessible, though most National Park Service facilities like visitor centers will be closed or limited. Maintenance and emergency services are being

During this period, visitors are strongly urged to practice Leave No Trace principles and help protect the park's resources by following our Nature Rules Cuidelines.

Regular updates on conditions or safety from NPS staff will be limited. Please plan ahead, honor posted closures, and consult local sources for real-time information.


Restrooms: Restrooms currently remain available.

Campgrounds: Campgrounds are open, subject to normal winter or seasonal closures.

Park Concessions Remain Open: Yosemite Hospitality will continue to operate within Yosemite National Park (lodging and food).

Visitor Information and Access: The Yosemite Welcome Center located in Yosemite Valley will be closed. Visitor information centers in gateway communities remain open. For Yosemite maps and more information stop at a visitor center before entering the park

BREAKING: DOI Announces Forming Of The U.S. Wildland Fire Service. USDA And DOI Issue Memos To Further Unify Wildfire Operations.

"In this Order, "unification" shall not be considered synonymous with "consolidation."



A major announcement was made today by the <u>Department of the Interior</u> and the <u>United States Department of Agriculture</u>. The DOI has announced the creation of the United States Wildfire Service, which unifies all its wildfire programs.

While the new USWFS awaits full unification with the United States Forest Service fire management organization, the two departments will increase the use of existing authorities to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of wildland fire management across all involved agencies.

A new fire chief will be appointed for the USWFS "promptly." They note the new chief of the USWFS must possess appropriate wildland fire management experience commensurate with the position.



Joint memos went out from both Departments, which I cover in full. This includes the unification of aviation and vehicles, modification of geographic regions and boundaries, PPE, unification of position descriptions, pay, benefits, prescribed fire, post fire actions, and the use of predictive services to deploy and position resources before wildfires break out.

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he Trump administration's early efforts to reduce the size of the federal workforce has delayed the development of new systems to better allow federal wildland firefighters to communicate and the U.S. Forest Service to track wildfire-fighting resources in the field, according to a new report from the Government Accountability Office.

Conducting operations in remote and often forested areas creates unique challenges: cellular coverage is often limited at best—and towers can be damaged by fires—and satellite phones are both cost-prohibitive and require a clear view of the sky. So wildland firefighters are outfitted with radios, and Forest Service vehicles are monitored via GPS.





With the federal government in a shutdown, the Forest Service has paused much of the wildfire preparation and prevention work it does on its 193 million acres of national forest.

A Forest Service contingency plan, current as of Sept. 30, calls for continued wildfire response. But the work necessary to reduce the fuels for massive wildfires, including prescribed burns, is on hold. Prescribed burns are an important tool to burn excess vegetation, keep landscapes healthy and reduce the risk of destructive wildfires. But starting last week, some Forest Service staff were told not to conduct burns in preparation for a potential shutdown.

- Law Enforcement and Investigations Reimbursements may be delayed for more than 500 state, local and tribal law enforcement partners.
- Hazardous Fuels Treatments to reduce fire risk, including prescribed fire, would be reduced.
- Public access to recreation sites would be reduced.
- Special Use Permits processing would be delayed.
- Mineral Regulatory Reform would be delayed.
- Statewide forest inventories would be delayed.
- State Grants for Forest Management and Wildland Fire Preparedness may be delayed.
   State and local fire departments' ability to train firefighters and acquire necessary equipment may be delayed and states and other cooperators will not receive reimbursement for ongoing forest management work on non-federal lands.
- Applied science including scenario planning for priority fuels treatments and timber market analyses as well as experiments that are timed with prescribed fire/weather timing can be severely impacted.

#### Should a lapse in appropriations extend for a prolonged period of time (i.e., longer than 5 days), describe the following changes:

- In any points in time when the furlough status of employees may change,
- how many employees would be affected; and
- the legal basis for such changes.

The Agency will review activities continued and paused during a lapse in appropriation and will make necessary adjustments to the employees exempted/excepted/furloughed to protect life and property or continue agency priorities where other available funds exist.

The Agency also reserves the ability to adjust activities between categories, including between those furloughed and exempted/excepted, if it is deemed in the best interest of the Federal government and there is funding availability from sources other than annual appropriations. For example, the activities listed in Category III and V are typically funded by annual appropriations. If it is determined that it is in the best interest of the Department/Agency to sustain critical functions and there are resources other than annual appropriations available, the Agency reserves the flexibility to work the Department and Office of Management and Budget to adjust the Categories for these employees. The Agency may also change the number of employees financed by supplemental funding where appropriate.

If these adjustments are needed, they will be discussed with the Department and Office of Management and Budget to ensure compliance with policy and direction.

#### Dear Partner:

Thank you for your ongoing collaboration and support of important priority work for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forest Service, I am writing to share information regarding the lapse in appropriations for FY 2026.

During this lapse in appropriations, the Forest Service is operating in accordance with the USDA Shutdown Plan (https://www.usda.gov/sites/default/files/documents/fy2026-usda-lapseplan.pdf), with a focus on life, safety, and Administration priorities. This priority work is being carried out by employees who are exempt from furlough and funded by sources other than annual appropriations. Many activities and projects associated with supplemental appropriations (e.g., deferred maintenance projects funded by Great American Outdoors Act, disaster recovery projects funded by American Relief Act, etc.) are still active.

To keep key partners apprised of our operations, I am sharing the following guidance which was provided to our field offices on October 3, 2025. Its intent is to help clarify the type and level of work allowed during this lapse in appropriations. This guidance could change over the course of the lapse in appropriations. If that is the case, we will provide an updated letter.

- . Travel: Travel for Forest Service employees is only allowed for the field delivery of exempt activities related to critical functions by employees designated as exempt. This does NOT include travel for attending meetings, conferences, or other non-critical
- · Payments: Payments will be processed for work performed by contractors or cooperators (contracts, grants, and agreements) deemed appropriate pursuant to the guidance issued for work considered a priority.

For work connected to efforts that are not considered to be a priority, invoices may be submitted for contracts, grants, or agreements during the lapse in appropriations; however, payments will not occur until the lapse in appropriations has ended.

For wildfire and emergency work, the Agency will continue to process payments, including those for casual hires (administratively determined) on emergency assignments.

- . Law Enforcement: Law Enforcement and Investigations (LEI) will focus on protecting employees and the public, Forest Service facilities, and developed recreation areas. LEI personnel will collaborate with local line officers as needed to ensure alignment.
- · Recreation: National Forest recreation sites remain open during the Federal government's lapse in funding. However, some services may be limited or unavailable. Our ability to maintain this operational status will be continuously monitored and is subject to change based on budget considerations and Administration priorities. Forest Service employees who directly support developed recreation site operations are continuing to work. Volunteer activities, such as campground hosting, will continue under existing agreements. Outfitter and guide services may continue under existing agreements. Regular seasonal closures will proceed as planned. Visitor centers, unless operated by a third party, will be closed. Concessionaire operations are not impacted by the lapse in funding. Recreation special uses, such as ski areas, are also continuing operations. Partner and contract work under existing funded agreements is currently ongoing and will continue as funding allows.
- Timber Production: Forest Service timber work is aligned with Executive Order (EO) 14225, "Immediate Expansion of American Timber Production". Therefore, all aspects of active forest management will continue as normal.
- . Active Harvest Projects: Active timber sale contracts, special forest products, and integrated resource contracts (Integrated Resource Timber Contracts and Integrated Resource Service Contracts) will continue. Good Neighbor Authority and agreements that include product removal administered through partners including States, Tribes, counties, and other partners, may continue if the project does not involve funding that may result in violations of the ADA.
- · Bid Openings and Stewardship Offerings: All current advertisements for timber and forest product sales, as well as stewardship contract offerings, will continue as planned. Bid openings and oral auctions may continue, and appropriate sale officers. contracting officers, forest products resource specialists, and collection officers will be available to conduct the sealed bid or oral auctions.
- . Timber Contracting Support Functions: Refunds, bill cancellations, and other transactions should be submitted in accordance with standard processes and procedures. Online processing systems will be available for routine business transactions after annual
- · Special Forest Product Permits: Over-the-counter sales of special forest products permits will continue because most are firewood permits which have a direct connection to human health and safety. Permits already sold to the public are still valid within their existing terms and conditions, and some permits may still be purchased online.

- . Working Capital Fund Nursery System: The Working Capital Fund Nursery System and staff, which includes six nurseries and two stand-alone seed extractories, will continue normal operations as they are critical life and safety facilities that process and protect the nation's seed cache and other living biological material and seedlings.
- · Reforestation and Stand Improvement Activities: Reforestation (e.g., planting, seeding, and surveys or certifications), stand improvement (e.g., non-commercial thinning, release, etc.), and other related activities (e.g., site preparation or cone and acorn collection) will continue.
- . Environmental Compliance Activities: It is expected that planning and associated processes for projects pursuant to EOs will continue through the lapse in appropriations. This includes but is not limited to compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act, National Historic Preservation Act, and Endangered Species Act. The Forest Service will continue to work on the nationwide environmental assessment to expedite post-fire recovery in burned areas, facilitating safe infrastructure, healthy forests, and timely recovery of forest products important to rural economies and communities reliant on National Forest Systems lands. This is a Forest Service and USDA priority in response to EO 14225 and Secretarial Memo 1078-006, "Increasing Timber Production and Designating an Emergency Situation on National Forest System Lands".
- . Grazing: In general, the Forest Service will not provide daily oversight of grazing operations except in a few special cases, such as complying with court-mandated, periodic oversight and monitoring direction, or facilitating orderly, end-of-grazing-season removal of livestock.

Upon the enactment of appropriations or a continuing resolution, Forest Service offices and facilities will resume program activities consistent with all applicable Agency and USDA





#### Dear John,

The federal government shutdown is still underway. While we have some good news for the Pacific Crest Trail, the effects of the shutdown continue to be felt.

The U.S. Forest Service has clarified that PCTA volunteers may continue their work on the trail. Corps crews are also permitted to move forward under existing agreements. This means important trail work doesn't have to stop entirely.

#### Still, the PCT is not unaffected.

Our federal partners—the Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and National Park Service—are furloughed without pay. This slows communication, approvals, and planning, and it destabilizes the partnerships that trails like the PCT depend on. Even with national guidance permitting our volunteer activities on the trail, we now need to work with local units for project approvals due to these furloughs.



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

**GREENWIRE** | Energy Secretary Chris Wright is defending the Trump administration's decision to cancel billions of dollars for climate-related projects — mostly in blue states so far — despite state officials and legal experts insisting the move runs afoul of the law.

Wright said during an interview on CNN on Thursday that his agency made the ultimate decision to cut the funding after a monthslong review of about 2,400 projects by a small group of seven or eight DOE officials who focused on "business conditions." The secretary also said more cuts, including in red states, are on the horizon.

The cuts were first revealed when White House budget director Russ Vought announced on X that the administration was axing nearly \$8 billion in "Green

Exxon CEO: New form of graphite boosts EV battery life, extends range

The invention, now being tested, can increase the life of electric vehicle batteries by as much as 30 percent.

ENERGYWIRE | Exxon Mobil said it has invented a new form of graphite that can increase the life of electric vehicle batteries by as much as 30 percent.

"We've invented a new carbon molecule that will extend the life of the battery by 30 percent," CEO Darren Woods said at the University of Texas at Austin's Energy Symposium on Friday. It's a "revolutionary step change in battery performance."

The invention is being tested by several EV manufacturers, Woods said. Used on the anode side of the battery, the synthetic graphite allows for faster charging, a longer life span and longer range for electric vehicles. Exxon last week announced the acquisition of several production assets from Chicagobased Superior Graphite, which will enable the company to scale-up manufacturing, with a goal of commercial production by 2029.

The Texas oil giant doesn't intend to become a battery maker but it plans to use its refineries, chemical plants and laboratories to produce some of the materials to be used in the energy transition. It also has plans to extract lithium, a major battery component.

"We don't do wind and solar, we have no issues with wind and solar, but we don't have capability in that space," Woods said. "But we do have capability of transforming molecules and there are enormous opportunities in that space to use hydrogen and carbon molecules to meet the growing demand."

Exxon has long been a player in the vehicle-battery space. The company invented the lithium-ion battery in the 1970s and created the plastic film for the first rechargeable version in 1991. Almost two decades ago, Exxon created a new type of material used to separate battery components.


While Exxon is moving ahead with its battery-material business, the outlook for hydrogen, another targeted growth area, is looking more challenged. The company has warned it may delay a low-carbon hydrogen and ammonia project in Baytown, Texas, due to a lack of interest from customers.

The shortening of the time frame available to claim hydrogen tax credits under President Donald Trump's so-called Rie Beautiful Bill may also slow market. GREENWIRE



#### BLM leader talks solar internally as projects languish

GREENWIRE | Weeks after Interior Secretary Doug Burgum imposed new restrictions on solar power development on public land, the Bureau of Land Management's acting leader met several times with other Interior Department officials on solar, according to a calendar of meetings obtained by POLITICO's E&E News through a public records request.

Although the calendar is an indication that solar isn't totally wiped from the BLM agenda, some prominent industry representatives say they've seen no other signs that the Trump administration has altered its position about renewable energy development.

Ben Norris, the Solar Energy Industries Association's vice president of regulatory affairs, said in an emailed statement that they've had no indication that BLM plans to begin incorporating solar into President Donald Trump's "energy dominance" agenda, which thus far has centered on coal and critical minerals mining, as well as oil and gas leasing.

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#### Pending Federal Government Shutdowns, National Parks, and their Economies

As a federal shutdown looms, Utah leaders say they will keep the state's crown-jewel national parks—Arches, Bryce Canyon, Canyonlands, Capitol Reef, and Zion—open to visitors. Local reporting details contingency funding and operational work-arounds meant to avoid the closed gates, shuttered facilities, and visitor confusion that marked past lapses (Tavss, 2025). At the same time, retired National Park Service (NPS) leaders are publicly urging Congress to reach a deal to prevent furloughs and service disruptions that reverberate through public-lands communities (Lind, 2025). The common thread in these stories is straightforward: reliable park access and gateway economic stability are inseparable.





### Federal Government Shuts Down Over Health Care Subsidies

Federal Government...

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The federal government is currently in a shutdown triggered by a lack of bipartisan agreement on government funding and access to health care coverage.

Congressional Democrats have pledged not to vote on a budget extension and end the government shutdown unless Congress extends subsidies for Affordable Care Act Marketplace plans.

#### **Fall Open Enrollment Creating Urgency**

Many Republicans in Congress argue that there is plenty of time before the end of the year to extend the subsidies, if they should be extended at all. But Marketplace open enrollment begins November 1. This gives little time for Congress to clarify what subsidies will be available before people begin shopping for coverage. 

#### SUMMARY

Governor Proposes Multiyear Spending Plan to Implement Proposition 4. In November 2024, voters approved Proposition 4, a \$10 billion bond measure focused on increasing the state's resilience to the Impacts of climate change. The Governor has proposed a multiyear spending plan to implement the bond, including appropriations totaling \$2.7 billion in 2025-26. The Governor also proposes shifting some prior appropriations from the General Fund and Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) to instead be supported by Proposition 4.

Proposed Plan Has Several Merits but Also Comes With Some Trade-Offs. We find that the proposed spending plan generally strikes a balance between quick distribution of funds and thoughtful implementation of programs. In many cases, it phases in funding to account for program readiness and builds on the significant prior funding provided in recent budgets for similar activities. Adopting a multiyear plan would offer a more coordinated, strategic approach and provide more funding certainty to departments and grantees. Despite these advantages, such an approach would make enacting subsequent changes more difficult for the Legislature if its priorities shift or circumstances—such as new fires or droughts—warrant a possible change in focus and timing. In addition, a multiyear approach may not be suitable for all programs because it would limit opportunities for future legislative deliberation over spending choices—which is particularly concerning for activities that are new or not yet well defined.

Administration Made Some Choices the Legislature Will Want to Review. Within some of the bond categories that have multiple allowable activities, the administration has selected the programs on which to target funding. In addition, the Governor's decision to shift the fund source for some programs to Proposition 4 would reduce the total amount of spending on climate-related activities, although this approach would free up funds for other priorities. The Legislature will want to ensure that the administration's choices align with its priorities.

Recommend Legislature Adjust Proposed Plan as Needed to Ensure It Aligns With Legislative Priorities. We offer several suggestions to ensure Proposition 4 spending reflects the Legislature's intent. First, we recommend the Legislature consider approving multiyear spending plans for existing and well-defined programs, but also consider requiring the administration to submit new budget requests in future years for programs that are new and less well-defined. Second, we recommend the Legislature consider clarifying spending guidance in statute for programs where bond language grants discretion around specific spending decisions. Third, we recommend considering requiring enhanced reporting to track how Proposition 4 spending is helping the state make progress toward its most important climate goals. Finally, we recommend the Legislature weigh fund shifts in the context of the overall budget and its highest priorities—if the budget condition requires General Fund reductions, such shifts may become important tools.


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




### **Climate Bond Basics**

- In November 2024, California voters approved Proposition 4, referred to as the Climate Bond.
- The bond allows the State to borrow up to \$10 billion for specific purposes described in the Bond Act.
- The Governor and Legislature give authority through the Budget Act to spend from the bond fund on programs and projects.
- Departments report cash needs to the Department of Finance to fund projects, and the State Treasurer's Office provides cash through bond sales based on those projections. The cash is used to reimburse projects.
- This process continues over many years, funding important projects all over the state.







What you need to know to vote in California's Nov. 4 special election on redistricting

All eyes are on California this fall as voters decide whether to approve Proposition 50, a partisan gerrymandering plan with significant stakes far beyond California's borders — for control of the federal government, for President Donald Trump's agenda and for Gov. Gavin Newsom's national ambitions.

Proposition 50 is the only measure on the statewide Nov. 4 special election ballot. If voters approve it, California would temporarily set aside its nonpartisan citizen redistricting commission and adopt new congressional lines that favor Democrats for the next three election cycles.

Here's what your vote would mean:

**Voting "YES" means:** You want California to redraw its congressional districts to give Democrats a potential advantage in the U.S. House of Representatives. This would counter redistricting efforts in other states seeking to give Republicans an advantage.

**Voting "NO" means:** You want California's congressional district lines to remain the same, a they were drawn by the state's nonpartisan citizen redistricting commission. This is likely to give Republicans redistricting in other states an advantage in the U.S. House.

### Background

Since June 2023, the Sierra Jobs First Collaborative, with funding from California Jobs First and administrative support from Sierra Business Council, has brought diverse leaders together to discuss, plan, and fund community-led, climate-forward, and economically resilient initiatives. 
California spans over 160,000 square miles, making it comparable in size to countries like Japan and Sweden.<sup>83</sup> Along with this vast scale comes a wide range of topographies and economies defined by these different natural features.

#### **Natural Resources**

California has more than 840 miles of coastline, the highest and lowest points in the continental U.S., more than 25,000 square miles of desert, and the tallest trees on the planet.<sup>84</sup> Our geographic variation is one of the reasons we are home to nine of the country's 61 national parks, the most of any state.<sup>85</sup> These parks drive significant tourism to California (nearly 11.4 million visitors in 2023),<sup>86</sup> contributing to the more than \$150 billion travel spend that took place in California in 2023, an all-time high.<sup>87</sup>

Our natural resources also underpin our leadership in other industries, from agriculture to renewable energy. Over one-third of the nation's vegetables and three-quarters of its fruits and nuts are grown in California alone. Because We also boast an estimated 340,000 acres of land with potential for solar energy development, Because will as unparalleled deposits of critical minerals necessary for numerous clean technologies that comprise 15% of global rare-earth element supply. Our other industrials are careful element supply.




















Since 2004, the partnership has engaged in collaborative, integrated planning and project implementation, investing over \$120 million in hundreds of projects that benefit the North Coast Region's communities and watersheds. The NCRP places a strong emphasis on local autonomy, leadership by locally elected Tribal and county representatives, the enhancement of natural and working landscapes, and resolution of failing water and wastewater infrastructure. 



#### 1. PURPOSE OF THIS DOCUMENT


The purpose of this Memorandum of Mutual Understandings (MOMU) is to establish a set of mutual understandings between North Coast Tribes, counties, agencies, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), resource conservation districts (RCDs,) local governments, and other partners and stakeholders with respect to collaboration on planning and project implementation to enhance the quality of life in North Coast communities and enhance the stewardship of natural landscapes. This collaborative coalition is known as the North Coast Resource Partnership (NCRP). This MOMU is intended to document long term understandings of the principles and goals of the NCRP. The NCRP requires partners requesting or receiving funding or support from the NCRP to sign onto to this MOMU to confirm their understanding of and commitment to the NCRP principles, goals and processes outlined herein.

#### 2. BACKGROUND: NORTH COAST REGION & NORTH COAST RESOURCE PARTNERSHIP


#### NORTH COAST REGION


- 2.1. The North Coast Region of California, as defined by this MOMU, comprises the Tribal and county lands contained within the North Coast counties of Siskiyou, Modoc, Del Norte, Humboldt, Trinity, Mendocino and Sonoma, as well as including the watersheds that comprise the North Coast Hydrologic Region per the State Water Resources Control Board.
- 2.2. Jurisdictional areas of Tribes, counties and individual agencies may lay outside the boundary of the North Coast Resource Partnership Region/North Coast hydrologic region. Where it demonstrably supports the purpose of the NCRP, as determined by the NCRP Leadership Council, collaborations may extend beyond the NCRP regional boundary into full counties, other counties and/or states and Tribal territories. In the case of energy independence endeavors, boundaries may encompass full counties.
- 2.3. The North Coast Region is 19,000 square miles, is 12% of California's geographic area, is a source region for water, biodiversity and forest-based carbon, all of which provide substantial benefits within and beyond the Region.

• MLTPA is developing the Westside Towns to Trails Plan as a key component of a future Eastern Sierra regional trail system. This plan will complement the Eastside Towns to Trails Plan as finalized by the Eastern Sierra Council of Governments (ESCOG), which together, may one day form a cross-Sierra trail network linking gateway communities to public lands and each other through outdoor recreation. The Westside Trails Plan focuses on four counties in the California Jobs First Sierra Region, identifying opportunities for trail and infrastructure connectivity between communities, adjacent public lands, and ultimately to three eastside counties via northern Alpine County. Using the same methodology as the Eastside Towns to Trails plan, the Westside Towns to Trails Plan evaluates existing inventoried trail and system road infrastructure, maps potential alignments, works with community stakeholders, and identifies environmental planning needs. The plan also explores opportunities to extend the network into the Central San Joaquin Valley Jobs First Region, including Tulare, Fresno, and Madera counties, as well as Yosemite National Park. This work enhances regional recreation access, supports sustainable tourism, and promotes economic development by improving connectivity across diverse California landscapes, and all through the renewed utilization of existing infrastructure.



Geographic location of the target audience





#### Eastern Sierra Mussel Prevention Collective to Launch Pilot Program This Labor Day Weekend to Protect Local Waters from Invasive Species

EASTERN SIERRA, Calif. - (August 26, 2025) - A new coalition of federal and state agencies, and local governments, the Eastern Sierra Mussel Prevention Collective, announced today that it will establish two watercraft inspection and decontamination (WID) stations over Labor Day weekend. This pilot project is a proactive effort to protect the region's pristine lakes and rivers from the rapidly spreading threat of aquatic invasive species (AIS), including the recently detected Golden Mussel.

The Eastern Sierra Mussel Prevention Collective is a joint effort between the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), the U.S. Forest Service, Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP), Southern California Edison, Mono County, and Inyo County.

The two WID stations will operate over the busy holiday weekend to intercept boaters and other watercraft users traveling into the Eastern Sierra. The stations will be located at:

- Mono Basin Visitor Center in Lee Vining.
- . Diaz Lake, just south of Lone Pine.

The schedule for the stations will be as follows: Friday, August 29 - Monday, September 1 7:00 am - 5:00 pm

The goal of this pilot program is to develop a framework and test logistics for WID stations in 2026 in not only these two locations but possibly others.

The primary purpose of this initiative is to prevent the spread of Golden Mussels and other AIS. The Golden Mussel, which was first detected in the U.S. in California in October 2024, poses a significant and evolving threat to the region. These mussels have rapid growth rates, can colonize a wide range of surfaces, and have been known to clog vital infrastructure, including

#### Justification for Modification

24-CS-11050400-006 Inyo Campground Improvement Project

Initial agreement funds: \$163,654 GAOA from FS, \$206,671 from cooperator

Modification funds: \$435,000 GAOA from FS, \$112,845 from cooperator

The cooperator has completed the initial scope items in this agreement to provide engineering surveys and schematic designs for the renovation of six Inyo NF campgrounds. These campgrounds are long overdue for redesign and renovation to meet the needs of current visitors and to improve resilience to natural disturbances like floods and wildfires. The modification will fund the next step in the project. The cooperator will prepare a construction document package and construction cost estimate ready for bidding.

If this modification is not approved, the six campgrounds will continue to degrade, deferred maintenance costs will continue to accumulate, and the public will be unable to fully access and enjoy their public lands due to the physical limitations of the campgrounds (such as: inadequate fire clearances, parking spaces too small for modern vehicles, not meeting accessibility guidelines, campsites to small for larger families, campsites not level or comfortable, restrooms outdated, and roads too narrow for RVs and emergency vehicles). In addition, \$2,000,000-\$4,000,000 in new local economic activity will be forgone annually if the campgrounds are not upgraded and do not meet the needs of current visitors.






tribal consultation and public scoping were completed. As I've said before, I also think the odds of getting the agreement modified before the end of FY25 are pretty low due to capacity constraints and new layers of approval needed, but I think it is still worth trying since the GAOA funds might go away at the end of FY26 otherwise.

To modify the existing Challenge Cost Share agreement, we need to show at least 20% contribution from MTLPA. That's about \$80k for the mod. The contribution needs to be made during the performance period of the agreement which started 4/23/2024. Can you provide a breakdown similar to the one below that we used for the original agreement budget to account for an additional \$80k+ contribution by MLTPA?




