Ever since Andrea Jones took over as Stellar Brew's nbew owner on June 1, things have changed for the greener. Between an attempt at worm composting (it got too cold for the worms to survive), biodegradeable cups, and using local products to shrink the coffee shop's carbon footprint, Jones is moving forward in the green revolution.

Stellar Brew is focused on being a central gathering place in town that "pushes going green by eating more greens," Jones said.

All of the shop's fruits and veggies come from local growers, and according to Jones using a paper cup is grounds for firing among her employees, so she is practicing what she preaches. Jones strives to buy her dishes from the Cast Off and places supply orders with other local businesses, such as Sierra Sundance, so that she doesn't have to call for extra trucks to make deliveries.

This winter bring your own bowl to Stellar Brew and enjoy some soup while you catch up with friends.

Jones also hopes to offer suppers with live music as the days grow colder.

FINDERS KEEPERS

After having a baby and realizing how quickly kids grow out of their clothes, 18-year Mammoth local Melissa Reeves opened Finders Keepers in March. The shop takes gently used children's items and resells them.

Reeves offers clothing for newborns through tweens, for kids up to size 14. She also offers toys, cribs, books and maternity clothing.

"I'm one of the few places in the Eastern Sierra to offer maternity items," Reeves said.

Reeves handpicks all the items in the shop to ensure that they are of good, clean quality. She encourages people to bring in their gently used items to receive store credit or to sell on consignment. Whatever items she can't take she passes on to IMACA and Wild Iris, so the inventory continues to move

"It's our goal to always bring the best current options to our clients and demonstrate the potential cost savings to be found in these technologies.

"Most importantly, we're local and we'll stay that way," he said, "a onestop shop for architecture, engineering and construction management."
